PERFECT TENSES

TOM: Who <u>do</u> you <u>work</u> for? <u>simple present</u> - general information

MARY: I <u>work</u> for Cool Computers.

TOM: How long have you worked there? present perfect - how long, since when

MARY: I'<u>ve worked</u> there for about five years.

OR

TOM: How long have you been working for them? <u>present perfect progressive</u> - how long, since when

MARY: I've been working for them since 2005. (with emphasis on continuing action)

TOM: Who <u>did</u> you <u>work</u> for before? <u>simple past</u> - completed action, finished time period

MARY: Before that, I worked for Valley Solutions.

MARY: Yes, I do. / No, I don't.

TOM: <u>Have</u> you (ever) <u>lived</u> abroad? *present perfect - asking about experience up till now*

MARY: Yes, I <u>have</u>. / No, I <u>haven't</u> (yet). "ever" = at any time, "yet" = up till now

MARY: I <u>lived</u> in (insert name of country). simple past - completed action, finished time period

TOM: What did you do there?

MARY: I <u>sold</u> (insert name of product).

TOM: <u>Have</u> you (ever) <u>operated</u> this kind of machine? *present perfect - asking about experience up till now*

MARY: Yes, I have. / No, I haven't (yet). "ever" = at any time, "yet" = up till now

MARY: I'm taking classes at Tack College. present progressive - now and continuing action
TOM: How long have you been studying there? present perfect progressive - how long, since when

MARY: Since last year.

TOM: What <u>have</u> you <u>been studying</u> (since last year)?

MARY: I've been studying web design.
